Feedback on the conference - Activate, Agitate, Advocate (and Celebrate!)

1. "As a young change-maker, the NZAEE Conference was invigorating, inspiring, unifying and deeply uplifting. The chance to connect with so many people who care about sustainability was amazing, including international leaders who are making a difference on such a large scale.

I'd love to share some of the insights and learning that we shared, as I found them incredibly valuable and hope others do too."

"Kirsty Albion (National Director Australian Youth Climate Coalition)'s message was extremely powerful and clear: climate change is a social justice as well as an environmental justice issue. She shared stories of how it is affecting the most vulnerable first and those who have done the least to deserve it, such as our neighbours in the Pacific who are risking losing their entire homeland and culture. 'Big brothers don't let their little brothers drown'.

"We can make a big difference, especially when we work together. Kirsty is the leader of the Australian Youth Climate Coalition <u>www.aycc.org.au</u>, a solutions movement driven by young people. Her advice for groups leading campaigns is to 'throw everything at the wall and see what works'.

Start with something fun to engage people, include a strong petition, hold positive protests and awareness-raising events, and remember that all these big organisations and companies are made up of PEOPLE - people that you can talk to, be kind and informative too, and work together with for your cause.

"Alison Cook leads the Solutions Project <u>www.thesolutionsproject.org</u>, and has long been part of the innovative Story of Stuff. I was incredibly inspired by her sharing of the importance of rethinking our world systems, because 'it shouldn't be so hard' to do the right thing. 'We can use these situations when it is hard to do good, as if metal detectors who can see how things could be better 'engineered' in our society'.

"Alison believes a place where change-makers often go wrong is overloading people with the facts, instead of appealing to our shared human values.

People don't need to be swamped in any more information; we need stories.

Stories of hope, change, and a better future.

"Brands are the current 'storytellers of our time' - every advert we see is designed to appeal to things we care about, like love, connection, community, health, kindness and other values. We can use this in activism, and it will make our campaigns much more effective!


"Try this activity: find three core human values to base an advert about an environmental issue around!

# 3. A reflection from Christchurch

The 2016 NZAEE conference was a highlight for the Canterbury contingent with comments such as 'fabulous' and 'well worth the time' to be able to connect with others working in similar fields.

Generally our Canterbury team felt the themes of the conference were about moving from the individual to the collective, compassion not competition, and connectivity with the environment.

We all commented on the wide range of presentation and workshops we could select from, often finding it difficult to choose but each coming away with a new perspective or renewed energy. thanks to inspiring presenters.

Many from our team said Dame Anne Salmond's keynote was a stand-out, closely followed by Kirsty Albion and Allison Cook. With respect to Dame Anne, it was her quietly powerful expression of the importance of embracing a true Treaty partnership that had a huge impact on conference attendees. She really is a Pākehā cultural go-between, as her long-term immersion in, and research on, Māori society, ways of thinking and living (both past and present), provides us all with insights as to what we could learn for the benefit of our country.

Kirsty Albion's enthusiasm for the power of collective action and her story of the impacts that can have on large businesses as well as communities offered hope. Too often we can become overwhelmed by the likely impacts climate change will have rather than focusing on what we can do now; Kirsty's keynote was a powerful call to action.

The Citizen Muscle Boot Camp Allison Cook shared with us sparked 'Ah Ha' moments for many of us, and will act as an inspiration to keep on doing, and improving on, what we already do with respect to helping children and young people develop their skills and attributes as citizens.

As for the workshops and presentations .... too many to mention, but here's a few highlights from our Canterbury team:

- The Research Symposium a useful update on what research is happening within the EE/EfS space; enlightening, informative, inspiring.

- Pūrākau as Pedagogy with Haana Wilcox. This really made participants think about the storybooks used in class that tell a Pūrākau. A very useful and challenging workshop.
- Collaborative Community Conservation Education A Youth Perspective and MAD –
  a great afternoon spent with awesome young people all keen to connect and truly
  make a difference for all our sakes. We think that there could be room for more input
  from these young people they were articulate, focused and ready to meet
  challenges .... and to lay down some challenges to us older ones! They were each
  inspiring role models.

The field trips were to great destinations but just not enough time to take all that was on offer in. Two of us went to Motuihe Island and delighted in exploring it rapidly – we're keen to return!

All in all, the 2016 conference was a valuable sharing and learning time; it both challenges each of us to think differently and reinforces our commitments to keep on doing the things we are already doing to bring about positive behaviour change for a sustainable future.

Thank you to the Auckland team for bringing together another engaging NZAEE biennial conference.

### Seaweek 2016 simply stunning!

NZAEE's flagship event Seaweek 2016 was a huge success, breaking records yet again with 213 registered events around the country and 14 competitions.

The theme for NZAEE's Seaweek 2016 was "Toiora te Moana - Toiora te Tangata, Healthy Seas - Healthy People". The theme challenged us to delve deeper into our many connections with the sea and look at what we are learning from studying its wonders. The issues that affect the sea are not necessarily obvious or immediate and many originate from actions taken on the land. Making the connection between catchment and sea, surface and depth, water quality and ecology, our use of the sea and its health - and how that affects our health - were all areas to explore within this year's theme as well as reflecting on the lessons the sea teaches us.

This theme will be repeated for 2017 and 2018 and new audiences will be targeted for engagement with Seaweek. In 2016 the new audience was pre-schools and their whanau. Over 60 early childhood education centres (mainly Enviroschools registered) in the Auckland region were provided with Seaweek and Marine Metre Squared resources and encouraged to participate in Seaweek activities by their Enviroschools Facilitators. A feedback session is planned for May when the strategy for expanding the engagement in this sector during 2017 will be considered.

The Ocean Champion competition ran for the third successive year, sponsored by the New Zealand Coastal Society who donated a \$500 prize to the winner, which was presented by their Vice-Chair at the Bill Ballantine Memorial Lecture event in Auckland. The aim of the competition is to celebrate all those individuals, groups and organizations who work so hard to look after our seas and the marine life that lives in them. 7 nominations were received and the winner was Taranaki based advocacy organisation *Friends of Waipara River* who attended the award ceremony to collect their prize.

Many new resources were developed and launched specially for Seaweek 2016 including a resource by DOC on Taiko (black petrel), resources about the Revive Our Gulf mussel restoration project on the Science Learning Hub, Forest & Bird's seabird identification guide, a water safety resource for pre-school children by Watersafe Auckland and a resource based on Young Ocean Explorers also on the Science Learning Hub. We have already received feedback from DOC that they have had a good take-up of their Taiko resource and that the vast majority of online referrals came direct from the Seaweek website.

Thanks must go to all those groups and individuals around the country who organised and coordinated events for Seaweek 2016 because without their huge and largely voluntary efforts Seaweek simply would not happen.

Thanks also to Seaweek's national sponsors Foundation North (formerly ASB Community Trust), Department of Conservation, New Zealand Marine Studies Centre (Otago University), Ministry for Primary Industries, Environment Canterbury Regional Council, Greater Wellington Regional Council, The National Aquarium - Napier City Council, DSP Print Group Ltd, New Zealand Coastal Society plus many local sponsors.

#### **Some Seaweek Events:**

#### Shark and Squid Dissections in the Town Centre!

Lab-in-a-Box was made available for local groups to use for three days at the start of Seaweek in Dunedin.

Lab-in-a-Box is a shipping container transformed into a cutting-edge mobile teaching and research laboratory. It brings science equipment and expertise to the community to support and extend science knowledge outside of a traditional setting (see http://labinabox.nz).

It arrived on the back of a lorry, early on Saturday morning, and was gently dropped in the middle of the Octagon – the heart of Dunedin city centre.

Teams from the NZ Sea Lion Trust, Kiwi Conservation Club, Department of Conservation, NZ Marine Studies Centre and the Otago Museum took turns as running experiments and displaying information to engage members of the public.

The University of Otago's Marine Studies Centre took up residence one afternoon with displays and resources relating to marine food webs, and fresh plankton under the video microscope. The highlight of the day for a keen group of local children and adults was to watch and assist with the dissection of a Southern Arrow Squid and a Spiny Dogfish Shark, to gain a better understanding of these creatures and their role in the ocean, examining the stomach contents and finding out how humans impact on the marine environment.

#### Kayaking amongst the mangroves

The chance to explore the mangrove habitat which is part of the Whangarei Harbour Marine Reserve at Waikaraka by kayak was taken up by a total of 123 participants during two Community Guided Kayak Day's for Seaweek 2016.

This free opportunity to celebrate Seaweek was provided by the Experiencing Marine Reserves programme and funded by the Department of Conservation.



Participants were guided through the mangroves and colonies of hundreds of nesting cormorants (shags) with expert kayaking tuition from Pacific Coast Kayaks.
